Tree of the Month — The Tamarind Tree Amanda Cox

The Tamarind (Tamarindus indica) is an evergreen indigenous to tropical Africa, and is widespread throughout the tropics. It is one of the most widely distributed tropical fruit trees in the world. In nature, it is slow growing and reaches heights of 40 to 60 feet.

appearance and the leaflets close at night like the Brazilian Rain Tree. Despite the delicate looking leaves, Tamarind bonsai trees are very sturdy. They tolerate heavy pruning, Pest/Diseases extensive root manipulation, wiring and even a little neglect.

The tree is wind and salt resistant and is widely used as a shade tree. When the wood is burned it gives off an intense heat, and the resultant charcoal is used in the manufacture of gun powder.

Blooming in spring, the 1" wide petaled flowers are yellow with orange streaks and are arranged in small racemes. These blooms are small and resemble orchid blooms. The blooms are followed by cinnamon colored scalloped pods that are edible and used in sauces, chutney, candies, beverages and other food items. Tamarind paste is widely used as well. You can find many Tamarind recipes. Normally, trees will produce flowers and fruit on new growth after about 8 to 10 years but Tamarind tree bonsai grown in pots will not flower.

Care

The Tamarind should be treated like a tropical tree so it will need winter protection when temps drop below 45 degrees but loves to be outside during the summer months. During the winter the tree can be moved indoors and placed in a sunny south facing window with a humidity tray.

In the summer the tree should be in full sun even after severe pruning of the roots and/or branches is best. The tree will respond sooner.

Fertilizing

Preferred ph is 5.5. Use an acid fertilizer weekly during the growing season and once a month during the winter. In early spring add a super phosphate to encourage blooming. Organic fertilizer is preferred. Over fertilization prevents good ramification and causes long internodes. Cut back on high nitrogen fertilizer after new growth is established.

Trimming/Repotting

Foliage can be trimmed any time of year, but spring is the best time to remove branches for bonsai styling. New growth will need frequent pruning during summer and roots should be pruned during periods of warm nights - 55 de-The foliage is bright green, dense, pinnate and feathery in grees or warmer. Repotting should be done in mid-summer when the tree becomes root bound.

Aphids on new growth and powdery mildew (especially in humid environments) are possible problems. Powdery mildew is a type of plant fungus and can easily be treated with a fungicide. The Tamarind Tree can also be susceptible to Scale, Leafspot, Caterpillars and Borers although not usually a problem.

Over watering, can cause leaf drop as well as branch dieback, by using a well-draining bonsai soil this should not be a problem.

Propagation

Seed: Tamarind seeds remain viable for months, will germinate in a week after planting. Best to germinate with root heat.

Cuttings: are harder to root but can be done with soft wood cuttings. However they are slow growers so a larger trunk cutting would be ideal.

Air layering: in the summer with a rooting compound can be obtained in a couple months.

What To Do:

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runing, pruning, pruning....seems it's a never ending task this time of year.

I carry a pair of scissors and a basket whenever I'm in the bonsai garden. In some cases you want to let the tree grow out of its profile, such as when an unhealthy tree is trying to regain its vigor. Or, if you are letting a sacrifice branch grow. In such cases, use your own discretion as to when it needs to be cut off.

Continue a regular fertilization schedule as long as the trees are growing. In August they generally go into a summer dormancy period. At that time, hold off on fertilizing.

When conifers go into summer dormancy, it is safe to repot them. It is also safe to dig evergreens safely. I learned this when I had a nursery and would regularly dig taxus and junipers in August. When this is done, they have a chance to push new roots prior to fall and winter ensuring their sur-vival. It is important to move them into shade for a while after digging and repotting before accli-mating them back to the full sun.

Watering is key this time of year too. My rule of thumb is to water 2 to 3 times a day when temps are above 90 and 1 to 2 times a day when temps are in the 80's. However, if it rains sometime during the day, check the soil to ensure there was sufficient enough rain to saturate the soil mass. If not, water!

Keep an eye out for pests and diseases and treat as necessary. Fungus is a problem when we get a lot of rain like we have this year. Some trees are unaffected while others are prone. Powdery mildew is the biggest pest. There are several sprays on the market to treat or prevent this problem.

Of course here in Indy, its time to get your trees ready for exhibition at the Indiana State Fair! Keep them healthy and pest free!
