

From the President

The June weather has been 'toasty', but it is good to see the trees developing. 90 degree weather is hard on the trees especially the Northern trees like White Scot and Mugo pines. There need somme shade protection and good hydration. I have found that placing all my trees on wet carpet and keeping them in in containers with Turface on the bottom has been invaluable; especially for the small bonsai. The only hazzard is roots growing on the carpet. I check the underside of each pot bimonthly.

The June meeting went very well. Mark [as usual] did an excellent presentation on care for Japanese Maples. His topic was timely. You have to remove many outer leaves to maintain and develop inner growth. Neil's program on Shoo-ins was a 'twist'. He demonstrated on a Maple that already had air layering and grafting. There were seedings planted in the same pot ready for grafting. He showed a picture of the original tree and outlined the good and bad features. One gets the impression that preparation is half the battle. Neil is a gifted teacher and ,unless you feel asleep, you could not miss several excellent developmental concepts. Thank You Mark and Neil.

Julys' program is the last in the series on developing bonsai skills. We will be doing a lecture and workshop on Accent plants, also called Kusamono. Mark and I have been gathering appropriate plants for the workshop, as well as bringing accent pots. If anyone wants to sell small pots, please do so. Please note that pots must be clean prior to planting.

Our club is made up of members with different expectations. Some want bonsai only as a hobby, while others wish to develop their skill and compete in shows. Both are welcome. We will have plants that are easy to take care of and will make beautiful home displays. We will also have plants that will meet the criteria of competition. Anyone who is willing to 'give it a try' will come out with a beautiful display.

These are some ideas you should consider prier to the workshop.

- 1. Have a sample of carpet to put your plant on.
- 2. If your accent plant is go to be with a specific tree, bring the tree in. I have made accent plants in the past, only to bring them home and they do not match up well with the tree.
- 3. Consider making several accent plants. The opportunity to do so may not be better that this workshop.

We will provide the soil for the plants. It is very different than Bonsai soil. We are working on plants, not trees. There is some cost for the plants. The one I will bring in are "Home Depot" plants, repotted. Marks plants have been grown specifically for Kusamono and will be more expensive. The price of the pots will be up to the individual sellers.

I am going to use the short program to give the basic instructions on how to make and care for accent plants. There is a link on Kusamono that should be in the newsletter. We will do an update on Junipers later. I have asked members of the board to be available to assist in composing the accent plants; best results are obtained with team work.

The June meeting began with a short program on Japanese maple by Mark Fields. The program included a live demonstration of how to cut back spring growth, ensuring that enough light reaches the inner layers of the tree. This generally involves trimming new growth back to the first pair of leaves, and either cutting the leaves in half or removing one of the pair.

This was followed by a demonstration by Neil Dellinger on grafting and air layering, with a specific focus on using these methods to create shohin. One suggested tip was to use a plastic pot of bonsai soil, rather than sphagnum moss and foil, when air layering. The pot can be cut to fit around the branch, and then stapled back together to hold the soil.















