

#### From the President

f you missed the February meeting you missed a fun learning experience. In my presentation I managed to only tip over 4 containers of soil and attempt to fill a cup with 5 holes in it with water. Oh well......I had fun and I hope there was some knowledge passed along.

Wow......What a month. 60 degrees one day and 11 degrees 12 hours later, more than once. Here's hoping those of you wintering bonsai outside took extra precautions with this extreme temperature fluctuation. Four or five warm days can cause the sap to begin rising in the tree and the sudden severe cold can actually freeze the sap which in turn will kill the tree. Not a good situation.

I store many of my bonsai in a hoop house, which is simply a PVC tube frame covered with white visqueen. The pots are covered with a 4 inch layer of mulch. When it was 60 degrees outside the temperature was only 38 degrees inside and when the temperature dropped to 11 degrees outside it only fell to 26 degrees inside. On the coldest morning when the outside temperature dipped to 11 degrees below zero the inside only fell to 18 degrees. That protection prevented the soil from going through a freeze / thaw cycle, more than once, thus keeping the sap from becoming active. Some of you may consider similar methods of protection in the future.

That's enough negativity, let's talk positive! We have some exciting events scheduled, one of which is happening right now.

There are Bonsai at the Indianapolis Museum of Art. I will not bore you with the details of how this developed but simply say "We are excited to be back". Through March 7 the IMA is featuring their Orchid collection, along with a few bonsai, both in the Museum and the Greenhouse. In the Museum there are 3 award winning bonsai located in the West end of the Asian Arts Exhibit area. Each bonsai will be on exhibit for 7 days and then removed and replaced with another due to the environmental conditions (very low humidity to protect the Art, not good for Bonsai). There are also 12 +/-bonsai exhibited along with the orchids in the Elder Greenhouse.

For our 2<sup>nd</sup> event we are going back in history. If any of you read our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary history handout you might recall the IBC had its beginning in 1968 when two people set up a booth at the Indianapolis Flower and Patio Show located at the Indiana State Fairgrounds to find enough participants to start a bonsai club. Obviously it worked. Guess what....we have a booth at the renamed Indiana Flower and Patio Show this year. The event runs from March 9 – 17 and we will be looking for volunteers to participate. We will have bonsai for sale but our primary goal is to recruit new members.

Not to be overlooked is the March 6 IBC monthly meeting. Repotting your Bonsai is the subject with a short demo and then a "Bring your own tree" repotting workshop. Soil, wire, screen mesh and assistance will be provided by the IBC but you must provide the tree, pot, labor and tools.

The meeting began with a short program by Mark Fields on care of repotting of plants at this time of year, including examples of several species. Remember: you repot a tree, growth will stall for several weeks as it recovers.

The long program by Paul Weishaar focused on choosing the right soil for your trees. The notes will be made available, but a few things to keep in mind: when choosing soil, make sure you take into account the needs of the tree (how wet or dry does it want to be?) and its location (full sun vs shade). Also remember that much of the advice on soil is written by bonsai professionals, rather than hobbyist who have to worry about who will water their trees while they go on vacation.

Starting next month, come at 6:30 (before the meeting) with a tree to get advice on care or styling. Also at 6:30, there will be pictures and/or video from bonsai nurseries taken by Larry Benjamin.

#### Caring for your Tropical Tree During the Winter Months

Spring is just around the corner! Many of us are eagerly waiting for the time when we can start working on our trees again. One of the nice things about tropical bonsai is that we can enjoy them in the house during this time of the year. Many of us have tropical trees in our windows or under grow lights. Some may wonder what we should be doing with our trees *right now*.

Although tropicals don't go completely dormant during the winter, they do slow down. Many tropicals will lose *some* of their leaves, particularly older leaves or ones that are near the interior of the canopy. During the winter, trees will also use less water and need less fertilizer. I usually only give them one light treatment of fertilizer per month during the winter. During the winter, trees are more susceptible to insect attack. This is because the trees aren't growing as fast, so they are less able to fight off or outgrow attacks like they can in the summer. Also, the air in our houses is often more dry and stale during the winter. You can help your trees by improving the airflow in the room and increasing the humidity around your trees. In my case, I leave the ceiling fan running to keep the air moving around my trees. I also put my indoor trees on humidity trays. Other humidity sources help, like humidifiers, fish tanks, decorative fountains or even misting your trees from time to time. Inspect your trees and look out for warning signs of insect attack like small webs, little white puffy fuzz and yellow, sticky leaves. The sooner you find and treat a problem, the better. I usually spray my tropical bonsai with a soap and oil spray every couple of weeks, the exception being my buttonwood trees. Oil spray will kill a buttonwood. I will normally treat my buttonwood trees with a systemic insecticide.

Things tend to get warmer in the greenhouse than inside my home, so the greenhouse trees speed up their growth more than the trees in my house right now. The active growth means that I can do more trimming and perhaps even a little early repotting. I usually don't repot any of the trees that have been in the house until I bring them back outside in the spring. Although some species of trees can survive indoors, they will thrive if you put them outside during the summer. The extra heat, light and humidity of the outdoors will always be better for the tree than leaving it inside all year. Even my wife's herbs and houseplants spend the summer outside on the back porch.

Personally, I don't put my trees outside in the spring until the overnight temperatures are reliably staying above 50F. I often tell people that they should have their tropical trees outside from Mother's Day until Labor Day. I know we all get excited when we get a warm streak, but I personally try to resist moving my plants out too early. Some trees don't really like getting moved around a lot, so moving in and out several times can cause a tree to drop leaves. I have too many trees to move in and out on a daily basis....that and I'm too lazy. The groundhog said that we are supposed to get an early Spring this year. Let's hope he's right!



### March Ronsai Care

(suggestions/considerations)

#### Indoor

Watering: Once a week by entirely submerging pot in water.

Fertilizing: Once every two weeks at 1/2 strength if leaves are growing.

Pruning: Light pruning of overgrown branches.

Potting: Repot with new soil.

Wiring: Ideal time to wire.

#### **Oudoor**

Location: Keep in a bright place, but avoid burning sunlight. Rotate bonsai every second day for even light.

Watering: Once a week only if trees start growing otherwise just keep soil moist.

Fertilizing: Do not fertilize.

Pruning: Prune if trees are not showing new growth.

Potting: Repot conifers.

Wiring: Wire conifers. evergreens, and deciduous.

Location: Keep trees cool but provide good light.
