Speaking of June 21, and realizing our next meeting is July 3, it has suddenly hit me that the year 2019 is half gone. How did that happen? I have items on the spring bonsai calendar to do which have yet to be done. Oh well.......

The July IBC meeting will feature a tropical bonsai workshop. Scott Yelich has obtained a selection of older, more mature pre-bonsai for this workshop. TIME FOR TROPICALS

SCOTT YELICH, EAGLE CREEK BONSAI

Since our upcoming meeting is going to focus on tropical bonsai, I decided that now would be a good time to write an article on tropical trees. Most of you who know me, know that I have a preference for the tropical trees. Although I appreciate all types of bonsai, 75% of my personal collection is tropical. This doesn't mean that I don't like other types of bonsai-- I do! I have pines, maples, juniper and elms in my collection. I even have a few indigenous to Indiana trees. I enjoy learning about and working on all sorts of trees. Still, tropical trees are my favorite for several reasons.

First of all, tropical trees were the first thing I had any success with. Like most people, I started out with a juniper. I did everything wrong and I killed it. I'm from a small town and I started doing bonsai pre-internet. I didn't have a good source to learn bonsai outside of an outdated library book from my small local library. Mike Devore was the first person I ran into that actually did bonsai or knew anything about them. Mike had a large greenhouse filled with tropical trees. I learned a lot from Mike and my first successful trees came from him. Once I tasted a little success, I gained confidence in my ability to care for bonsai. I was hooked. To this day, I think there is no better tree than a ficus when it comes to learning bonsai. If more people started out with ficus trees rather than with juniper trees, there would be a lot more people dedicated to the art of bonsai.

Another reason why I enjoy working with tropical trees can be tied to my general lack of patience. I don't like to wait on things. I started doing bonsai as both a way to relax and a way to teach myself patience. That being said, I prefer fast growing trees over slow growing trees. Tropical trees have a longer growing period than do trees that have to go dormant during the winter. Although tropical bonsai will slow their rate of growth over the winter, they never completely stop. When you put them outside for the summer, they tend to grow faster than most other trees. Therefore, you often get a more developed tree in less time if you choose to use tropical trees.

Still another reason why I prefer tropical trees is their dura-

bility. For many of the trees that go dormant, like pines and juniper, you can normally only perform one major task per season. If you tried repotting, pruning an wiring a tree all in one afternoon, there's a good chance you'd kill it. With many tropical trees, I can safely perform all tasks at once. Since I can do more at once, the tree can develop and improve much faster than bonsai that need to go dormant in the winter.

Finally, having some tropical trees in your collection makes bonsai a hobby for all four seasons. Around mid November, my outdoor trees go into their winter protection. I place them by a windbreak and mulch them in. Since I let the snow fall on my trees, they are often frozen to the ground in the mulch, and I don't do anything with them until they thaw out in mid to late March. Mulching my trees in is always kind of a sad time for me. For some people, their bonsai season is over, and they don't have an opportunity to tinker with their trees until the weather starts to warm up. Not me! I'm still watering the trees every day in the greenhouse and about every other day for the trees I have inside the house. Although I don't generally do any repotting or defoliating during the winter months, I still do some trimming and wiring.

If you prefer deciduous or conifer trees over tropical trees, that's fine! I think we all appreciate the many types of trees that can be used for bonsai. Our preferences may depend on our personal likes, who's influenced us as bonsai enthusiasts and our growing conditions. I'm not going to argue with someone about what they choose as a personal preference. That being said, I think it's still good for all people who are into bonsai to take on a couple of tropical trees. They have some nice advantages and they'll give you something to look at and work on during the months when many trees are dormant.


