Is It Winter Already?

I got up this morning and checked the thermometer. It was 25 degrees! It's only mid-November!

In the past, I put my trees away for the winter the weekend before Thanksgiving. I did that for 40 years. Last year I went to Japan the middle of November and wasn't going to return until the week of Thanksgiving so I decided to put them away the first weekend in November. When I returned from Japan I found the temperatures much like they are this year.

This year I tried to line up help to help me put my trees away sometime in early November. Because of the number of trees I have and the fact that some of them weigh well over 100 pounds, I must have help getting them off my benches and on the floor of my huts. I hate to admit it but I'm getting old. I have had 2 spinal fusions and both shoulders rebuilt and cannot do the lifting and bending over like I could when I was young. Thank goodness I have plenty of friends who like to help me.

The only weekend I could get everyone together to help was on November 1. Temperatures started out around freezing and were in the low 40's by the time everyone arrived. We worked for a solid 4 hours to get all of the benches in the huts out, the trees placed on the floor and mulched in. I made sure that we left paths where I could get to the trees to water and work on them during the winter months. I spent the next week getting the white poly installed. Last weekend I thoroughly watered all of the trees as the weather forecast was predicting daytime highs in the 30's with nighttime lows reaching the teens. I also treat all of the trees for insect and fungus with a dilute mixture of lime sulfur, daconil and malathion.

From now on, my trees are going into winter storage the first week in November.

Now for some advice. Every year I receive numerous phone calls and texts from friends and customers asking how and when they should start protecting their trees from the winter cold. My advice varies depending on what they have available to use. Some can only bury the pots in the soil up close to their house. Others have an unheated barn or garage available to them. Some tell me they always put their trees away the weekend before Thanksgiving.

One thing I do is that I watch the weather forecast daily and make plans according to that. Granted, being retired now, I have a little more time than most, but I really like the collection of trees I have amassed and want them to survive. I'm sure that you feel the same about your trees.

Some simple things to remember are that you want them the stay evenly cold when they are dormant. This can be done by insulating your trees roots using mulch, shredded leaves or soil. This helps the root mass from freezing and thawing. This can cause irreparable damage to the roots. Using this method, they freeze and stay frozen. I checked my huts this morning. They are now frozen for the most part. They should be completely frozen by the weekend.

My shohin size trees are stored in large plastic concrete mixing tubs filled with Turface. Their pots are buried to the top in the Turface. This insulates them the same as the mulch does around the larger trees.

All of the trees are all stored in the same huts covered with white poly in order to keep the temperature inside from heating up too much. I also leave the 50% shade cloth on the huts under the poly which helps them stay cool as well. The temperature usually stays 10 to 15 degrees warmer than the outside air.

When the temperatures are above freezing I open the doors on the huts to equalize the temperatures and humidity. The soil in the pots will look dry when they are frozen solid as the ice crystal give that appearance. When the days are warmer and the surface begins to thaw they will look wet. If I see that they need water during the winter months I water as needed. If snow is present outdoors I'll throw some of the light fluffy snow in the hut around the trees. As it melts, the trees are watered.

It is important to remember that the wind is your biggest enemy during the winter. When you store the trees outdoors, it is imperative that they are protected from bitter cold wind chills. This can be done by storing them on the south or east side of your house.

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You can also provide shelter by installing temporary posts and burlap.

As many of you know, I have many trees planted in raised beds filled with compost soil out in the open. I really don't provide any protection from the wind for them. Even with the extremely cold winter we had last year I didn't lose a single tree. As luck would have it, we had about a foot of snow on the ground when the temperature dropped to minus 16 degrees. When spring arrived I was amazed to find that I had only lost some of the tip growth on my trident maples and only the needles on the Japanese black and red pines that were above the snow were desiccated and brown. The buds on the end of the pines that were brown were fine.

Hopefully you have your trees tucked in for the winter. If you don't, you need to get them in as soon as possible. Good luck!

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
